

# Busted: The Top 4 Most Common Pet Myths

(BPT) - It's no secret that Americans love their pets. Your pet needs annual wellness check-ups, vaccines, dental exams and nutritional consultations, just like humans do.

#### Myth 2: Table scraps are OK.

Did you know that one ounce of cheddar cheese for a 20-pound dog is like a human eating more than one and a half chocolate bars? That same piece of cheese for a 10-pound cat is like eating almost three full chocolate bars! Table scraps are basically empty calories for cats and dogs. They need precisely balanced nutrition for their specific life stage and special needs to remain healthy. humans. Learning to read what your pet is telling you will go a long way in helping to build a fulfilling relationship. Ask your veterinarian for advice if you feel stuck learning your pet's body language cues.

## **Dollars and Sense**

## Effect of Mortgage Rate Increases

Usually a significant increase in interest rates will slow the housing market. From historic lows in the range of 3% to 3.5% in early May to 4.5% to 4.75% in early September homebuyers, and homeowners, have had to adjust their housing expense budget. Refinancing has slowed to a trickle because most people have already refinanced and for those who thought they were smarter than the market, well, they just missed a once in a lifetime opportunity.

For those seeking to purchase a home, an increase in interest rates from 3.5% to 4.5% amounts to an increase of .58 cents for every \$1,000 of loan amount. In other words, the payment on a \$100,000 loan is \$58 higher at 4.5% than 3.5%. You can figure the increase by multiplying the amount borrowed in thousands by .58 cents.

For most buyers this should not be the difference between buying a home and not buying a home. For many first time buyers today's more reasonable real estate prices mean you can purchase a home and have payments less than what you may be paying in rent, and

I understand that many of you feel that home buyers should put some "skin in the game" in order to realize the American Dream and may take offense to those who don't, but the fact remains that since the end of the Second World War and into the 1960's the Federal Government has been there to help home owner wanna be's realize the American dream.

Through the VA home guarantee program, the FHA 203(b) program and the Rural Development programs millions of people have been able to access funds to purchase a home. You can buy a house without a 20% down payment; you can buy a house without 10% down. You can buy a house with no money down, and on top of that..... you can even buy a house without any money for closing costs!

If you followed that last sequence you may have concluded that "Heck Tolbert, it sounds like I could buy a house with no down payment, AND I can buy a house without any money for closing costs." If you did come to this conclusion than you would be correct. There are mortgage programs available where you can purchase a home for basically no money, nothing out of your pocket, for either a down payment or closing costs.

If you are a veteran, I first must say to you, thank you for your service to our country. Thank you for giving precious years of your life to protect the freedoms that all Americans enjoy. A benefit of your service is the VA mortgage program that provides 100% financing and allows the seller of the property to pay your closing costs. This means, you can, through the negotiation of the contract process, buy a house with no money; no down payment, no closing costs.

So, if you are a veteran and you have not purchased a home, get with it. If you have a job and credit you can be a happy homeowner. The only thing you need is you Certificate of Eligibility that can be easily retrieved either online or through the local VA office. The only thing you will need is your DD214.

But, what do you do if you are not a veteran? How can a non-veteran get their hands on a program as good as that?

Through the Rural Development Program veterans and non-veterans can purchase a home with no down payment and no funds for closing. The buyer's closing costs can be paid by the seller as a part of your negotiations of the price. Keep in mind every dollar of closing costs paid by the seller is a dollar less that the seller is actually receiving in net proceeds.

With basically the same benefits as the VA program Rural Development, or RD, gives those worthy home buy-

The only limitations of the RD program are income and location based. To be eligible for the program your income must fall below the statutory limit that is based on family size. The limit starts at \$96,150 for a couple and goes up from there based on the size of the family.

The program is also only available in designated "Rural" areas that just so happen to be the entire Eastern Shore, with the exception of certain areas of Salisbury. Basically, the program is available for the purchase of homes anywhere on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, and puts buyers here on the Eastern Shore at a distinct advantage over buyers on much of the Western Shore that is not considered rural.

The condition of the property is a factor in both of these programs. For either the VA or RD programs the homes be-

ing purchased must be in good condition. Basically the homes must comply with HUD minimum property standards that require the home to be in sound condition. All electric, plumbing, heating in good functioning condition and a roof in good condition. There should be no cracked or peeling paint either inside or out and the flooring needs to be decent and not show signs of exposed sub floor.

Appraisers are also required to note anything about the house that could be considered a health or safety hazard that could have a negative impact on the value. This can often include homes that are in some state of repair or renovation. If there is something about the property you are not sure about consult with your realtor or lender.

Today's real estate market is good for

potential buyers, especially if you are buying for the long term. Don't let doomsayers discourage you because prices may not have hit the bottom and interest rates have gone up. Prices have hit bottom and are increasing in some neighborhoods. Sitting on the sidelines because you think prices will go lower will end up costing you more the longer you wait. Just ask someone who has been making low offers on properties. Chances are they are still looking.

If you are considering buying do it today. Call to find out how much of a mortgage you qualify for. You may find that you can own for less than you are paying in rent. ## Learn to Prepare Taxes and Make a Difference

How can you make a difference? Simple. Help your community in preparing taxes free of charge by becoming a volunteer with the Tax Aide Program.

Tax Aide is a community-based program. They provide free tax return preparation for people who need tax help but can't afford it. People with low-to-moderate incomes, seniors, people with disabilities and those with limited English skills usually qualify for this free service.

Here are five good reasons why you should become a Tax Aide volunteer.

- No previous experience is required. Volunteers receive specialized training and have the option of serving in a variety of roles. If you're fluent in a language other than English, you can help those who do not speak English.
- Tax Aide uses IRS based training material, provides free tax law training and materials that allow volunteers to prepare basic individual income tax returns.

- Volunteers learn many aspects of tax return preparation. This includes tax deductions and credits that benefit eligible taxpayers, like the Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit and Credit for the Elderly.
- The hours are flexible. Volunteers generally serve an average of three to five hours per week. Tax Aide Volunteer programs are open from February 1 through the tax filingdeadline, which will be April 15, 2014.
- The Maryland Mid-Shore Volunteer sites are located in Caroline, Queen Anne, Kent & Talbot counties. You'll find them

- in senior centers, libraries and other convenient locations. The Tax Aide sites offer free electronic filing for both federal and state tax returns.
- As a volunteer, you become part of a program that has helped people file tax returns at no charge for more than four decades. With Tax Aide, you do make a difference. It's people helping people. It's that simple.

## **Drug Free Caroline Coalition**

Involving the Caroline County Community is an important goal of the Drug Free Caroline Coalition (DFCC). Community members, neighbors, friends, and family are an integral part of achieving the goals of the DFCC which are targeted as: reducing underage drinking, substance abuse and drinking and driving within our community. While law enforcement and the court system can enforce laws and penalize violators of these laws, the mission of the DFCC is to prevent these illegal actions.

The DFCC encourages community members to become engaged in the promotion of the coalition's goals.

Alcohol laws in Caroline County are governed by the Caroline County Li-

...strategies, programs and services for drug and alcohol prevention.

quor Board which is served by a three member board and the Alcohol Beverage Inspector. Currently, there are 40+ establishments including restaurants, convenience stores, taverns, and clubs which hold alcoholic beverage licenses in Caroline County. To assist the Liquor Board in regulating alcohol laws in the county, community members can report violations to the Board at 410-479-8100. Violations include signage at carryout locations, which must post "No sales to minors," and taverns which must post signage stating, "No one underage of 21 is admitted." Also, over -serving alcohol to customers is a violation. These are the most common violations seen by the Liquor Board.

Establishment of the" TIPS Line", allows community members to anonymously report underage drinking, drinking and driving, or adult purchases for underage youth. This dedicated line can be reached at 443-786-7489. Report your concern and the Sheriff's Department will determine the action necessary to address the call.

"The Drop It In The Box" program provides county residents with a method to dispose of unwanted or outdated medications including prescription or over –the counter medications. Located at the Denton Police Department and



## Lead Poisoning Prevention Week

Annually, National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week is observed to highlight and educate parents and children on the dangerous health effects of exposure to lead, especially the hazards of lead-paint in older housing. Occurring the last full week in October, Lead Poisoning Prevention Week embraces a different theme each year that underscores the many ways parents can reduce a child's exposure to lead and prevent its serious health effects. This year EPA, CDC, HUD and local health departments will observe National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week from October 20-26 and the theme is "Lead-Free Kids for a Healthy Future."

In conjunction with National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week, EPA is also participating in the first International Lead Poisoning Prevention Week of Action. During the campaign week, the Global Alliance to Eliminate Lead Paint aims to raise awareness about lead poisoning; highlight countries and partners' efforts to prevent childhood lead poisoning; and urge further action to eliminate lead paint. Even though there is wide recognition of this problem and many countries have taken action, exposure to lead, particularly in childhood, remains of key concern to health care providers and public health officials worldwide. Paints containing high levels of lead are still widely available and used in many countries for decorative purposes, although good substitutes without lead are available. This is an opportunity to mobilize political and social commitment for further progress.

Key factors that will help during lead poisoning prevention week and throughout the year are:

#### Learn About Lead

- What is lead?
- Where is lead found?
- Who is at risk?
- What are the health effects of lead?

#### **Protect Your Family**

- Test your child
- Check and maintain your home
- Before you buy or rent a home built before 1978, gather information
- Renovate right, make sure lead safety is a part of your renovation
- · Test your home's drinking water

#### **Know Your Home's Danger Zones**

 If your home was built before 1978, old lead paint on your walls, doors, windows and sills may be dangerous.

## Report Uncertified Contractors and Environmental Violations

 The most important factor to remember is "Lead Poisoning is Preventable." During National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week and throughout the year, Caroline County Health Department has various informational pamphlets and booklets available to the public.

# Tips, Classes and Programs to help you live healthier!

## October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month!

This year in the USA it is estimated that 296,980 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer. 39,620 women will die from breast cancer.

It is time to take action and be breasthealth aware. Susan G. Komen for the Cure recommends that you:

 Know your risk by learning about your family health history and talk

- to your health care provider about your personal risk.
- 2. Get screened. Ask your doctor which screening tests are right for you if you are at a higher risk. Have a mammogram every year starting at age 40 if you are at average risk. Have a clinical breast exam at least every 3 years starting at 20 and every year starting at 40.
- Know what is normal for you. Know how your breasts look and feel and report any changes to your health care provider.
- Make healthy lifestyle changes by maintaing a healthy weigh, add exercise to your routine, limit alcohol intake, limit menopausal hormone use, breastfeed, if you can.

Taking care of your personal health is

important. Taking care of your community and beyond is also valuable! Attend local health fairs. Pick up literature and educate yourself and others about breast health awareness. Offer to take a friend or family member for their mammogram! Support local activities that raise funds for breast cancer research and assist with helping local women be screened for breast cancer.

# County residents take advantage of free discount cards to save money on prescriptions

Since the introduction of the Caroline County free prescription discount program, county residents have filled 259 prescriptions with the cards at discounts averaging 20% - 61% per prescription. In all, \$3,700 has been saved.

"We are pleased to see so many residents take advantage of this free program," said Wilbur Levengood, President, Caroline County Commissioners. "Our residents can really see significant savings on their prescription medications simply by presenting this card. There is no enrollment form, no membership fee and no restrictions or limits."

Caroline County launched the program to help consumers cope with the high price of prescriptions. Through the program, the county is making the free prescription discount cards available through a partnership with the National Association of Counties (NACo). The program, which is free to the county and to residents, offers an average savings of 24 percent off the retail price of commonly prescribed medications.

The cards may be used by all county residents, regardless of age, income or existing health coverage, and are accepted at six county pharmacies. A national network of more than 60,000

participating retail pharmacies also honors the card. The card can be used on all prescriptions not covered by insurance, as well as on pet medications.

Residents can print an ID card at www.caremark.com/naco. Cards are also available at the Caroline County Tax Office located within the Caroline County Circuit Court, 109 Market St., Denton, Maryland. County residents can call toll-free 877.321.2652 or visit www.caremark.com/naco for assistance with the program.

Caroline County joined almost 1400 counties across the country currently offering the NACo Prescription Discount Card Program to residents. Since the program's inception, participating counties have saved their residents more than \$540 million on the cost of their prescriptions.

The program is administered by CVS Caremark.

Hey Melanie-

So, I actually have prescription insurance with my husband's employer, and not with Caroline County. A couple of months ago I had strep throat and went to Target to fill my prescription for an antibiotic. I had previously printed out the NACo insurance card, but never used it. Thankfully it was in my wallet when I went to Target because somehow there was a glitch with the company who I had my prescription insurance with and they claimed I was not insured by them. The cost of the antibiotic without insurance was about \$65. I remembered that I had the NACo discount card in my wallet and decided to try that



rather than argue with the insurance company (having a wicked sore throat and all!). Using the discount card I only had to pay \$12.50 for the antibiotic, so it saved me more than \$40. In casual conversation with a friend who works for a local business in Caroline County I was recounting the situation and she was instantly interested in the discount card. Apparently the company she works for has a very high deductible for prescriptions, so she always ends up paying full price for prescriptions when her kids get sick with strep/ear infections/etc. – typical stuff they pick up in school. She never reaches the deductible because no one in her family has routine medicines. She has since used the card and is very grateful for it. She was actually a bit miffed that she did not know it existed a year ago. She has also shared it with the other employees at the company.







# Nurse Finds Inspiration After Cancer Journey

As a longtime nurse in the intensive care unit and clinical education coordinator for University of Maryland Shore Medical Center at Easton, Kim Brice, RN, knows the high level of care that is available to Mid-Shore residents close to home and family. She never knew just how good that care was however, until she began her own cancer journey. The Easton resident and mother of four was diagnosed with Advanced Stage IIIC ovarian cancer in the summer of 2012. From that moment on, she says she understood for the first time what many of her patients had gone through.

"I had always been healthy so I was fortunate that I had never received such a life-changing diagnosis before," says Brice. "Now that I have been through my journey, I understand that 'blank look' you get after you receive unexpected news about your health and how it feels to suddenly be dependent on others to take care of you. I think that today, having been through that, I can relate better to them."

While Brice's ovarian cancer protocol was one that had never been performed at University of Maryland Shore Regional Health's cancer center, the physicians and staff did not hesitate – and neither did Brice.

"It was a unique dose of chemotherapy with a unique port location but they never hesitated in offering me the option to get my treatments here," says Brice, whose care was coordinated seamlessly between a designated nurse at UM Shore Medical Center at Easton and an oncology nurse at UM Shore Regional Health's outpatient cancer. "They did an amazing job. No one should ever have to leave the Mid-Shore to get the care that they need. To be able to get those treatments close to home made a world of difference for me and my family."

Now that Brice has completed her treatments and is one-year cancer free, she is finding new ways to give back to the community, and to the patients that she cares for.





"I understand how badly you feel after chemotherapy, how even the slightest movement around your port can be so painful," says Brice. "When I see these patients in the ICU, I understand the extra emotional and physical needs that they have and can be a better nurse to them in the process."

In addition to improving her nursing practice, one of the ways Brice plans to give back is to share her story of success with other cancer patients.

"They were amazing with my treatments," adds Brice. "Everyone was in sync and went the extra mile to make sure I was getting the best possible care. I saw others that were getting care who were treated the same way. It wasn't just because I was a fellow nurse. They are truly the best at what they do."

Kim plans to participate in a 5K walk to benefit the Central Maryland Chapter of the National Ovarian Cancer Coalition later this fall. She is raising funds and looking for teammates for the walk, which takes place on September 29.

"When you go through the kind of journey that I have been through and received the kind of care I have, you feel compelled to give back," adds Brice. "I just want people to know the kind of services and people that we have right here on the Mid-Shore."







#### **Celebrating 10 Years of Service**

CASA of Caroline, Inc. (Court Appointed Special Advocates) is celebrating 10 years of service to abused and neglected children in the community. Judge Owen Wise established the nonprofit, as he recognized that children in the foster care system needed someone to speak solely on their behalf. Volunteers are recruited and trained to be the eyes, ears, and voices for these children. The CASA volunteer works with the child, the family, the foster family, the teachers, therapists, doctors, social workers and attorneys to ensure that a safe, caring, and permanent home is secured for the child. CASA of Caroline opened its doors in 2003. The first class of seven volunteers were trained and appointed in March 2004 under former Executive Director Joanne Staples, who served until 2008. Jennifer Rinehart, current Executive Director states, "It is a bittersweet milestone. We are proud of the work CASA has done to help these children in our community, but we wish our services were not needed."

Currently CASA of Caroline has 14 appointed and trained volunteer advocates, who serve 28 children. This is the highest number of children CASA of Caroline has served in its 10-year history. Currently, CASA of Caroline has more children in foster care than any other of the surrounding counties, combined. In 2012 Caroline County Department of Social Services placed 41 children into foster care. CASA of Caroline's advocates have worked tirelessly over the years, speaking for children in court and working to ensure the children are placed in safe, permanent homes. CASA of Caroline Volunteer Advocates are able to assist these Children in Need of Assistance (CINA) by being their voice and investing time, energy and heart. As one of our volunteers has said of the children they worked with "It wasn't about what I gave them, it was what they showed me."

Since 2004 CASA of Caroline has successfully trained 71 volunteers. As the CASA of Caroline program continues to grow, there is always a need for more community volunteers to become advocates. There is an active board of directors consisting of ten devoted community members. "The board continu-

ally works to find the resources necessary to meet the needs of these children." said Ed Centafonte, president of the board of directors. CASA of Caroline Inc. has made a commitment -a promise to our children- to put a CASA volunteer into the life of every foster child that needs one in Caroline County

"Our core belief is that all children deserve to grow up in a safe and stable home, and CASA of Caroline, Inc. advocates will continue to support these children until every child in our community has that opportunity," said Jennifer Rinehart. It is the support received from the community and the dedication of the advocates that has been the driving force of CASA of Caroline's success. While the national average length of service for CASA advocates is 24 months, the CASA of Caroline program's average length of service is 36 months. "A testament", Rinehart said "to the commitment of the advocates to the abused and neglected children they serve."

To start the yearlong celebration, CASA of Caroline will launch several fundraisers including our 4th Annual Holiday House Tour, December 14th, and our 3rd Annual Garden Party in the spring.

## DES Urges Halloween Safety!

Halloween is a fun time for children and adults too! It also presents many opportunities for a disastrous accident! Too often this will involve a child pedestrian during their trick-or-treat experience. The Caroline County Department of Emergency Services issues these reminders to have a safe Halloween:

Make this Halloween an opportunity to review some basic safety precautions with your family. Children should be instructed to walk on sidewalks, or the left side of a roadway (facing traffic) if there is no sidewalk. Do not cross yards and lawns where there can be hazards. Use walkways and driveways to approach a house.

Some areas for special attention include:

- Always accompany your children during their trick-or-treat activities. Observe local regulations regarding the hours of trick-ortreat.
- Visit only neighborhood homes familiar to your family.
- Never enter the home of a stranger.
- Review basic pedestrian safety practices and have everyone carry a flashlight.
- Costumes should be fire retardant and made of light colored materi-

- al. Strips of reflective tape placed on the costume can improve the visibility of your child.
- Use facial make-up instead of a mask. A mask can block a child's vision possibly preventing them from seeing an approaching car.

According to Kevin Knussman, public information officer for Caroline County Department of Emergency Services it is especially important to take a minute or two and discuss safety with your children prior to hitting the streets: "Children can get very excited about the opportunity to celebrate and obviously are not exactly thinking in terms of safety. Take a few minutes to tell them what is expected of them. This can prevent a very tragic event and youngsters will respond to a positive safety message from parents."

Once the trick-or-treating is completed your "little creature" will likely return with many treats. Make sure to carefully inspect all the items. Ensure that none of the items have been tampered with in any way. Limiting the amount of sweets that are eaten by your little ones might prevent later episodes of upset stomach.




